Phone books from 1996 to now are considered to be current and are available as paper copies in library stacks. With the exception of phone books in the District of Columbia, Chicago and 14 states that were microfilmed, all phone directories up to 1976 are only available as paper copies, although the Library of Congress continues to convert all phone books to microfilm until 1976. These 14 states are Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas and California; Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida and Georgia; and Hawaii, Iowa, Maryland and Pennsylvania. View phone catalogs in microfilm by going to the LJ 139B reading room and accessing the self-service microfilm collection, which also includes microfilmed phone books from 1976 to 1995.
